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
Welcome to worship!



Full to Bring An expansive lent

LENT is one of the major seasons of the Christian calendar. It originated as a time to leave the old life behind and prepare to be baptized into a new way of living. Lent is a practice of stepping away from one kind of life to live another. We step away from the American obsessions of success, greed, corruption, scarcity, and emptiness to adopt a life of wholeness, generosity, compassion, and abundance. Our theme this year, in partnership with the art collective *Sanctified Art*, emphasizes this kind of life.

Full to the Brim trusts in the promise of our baptisms—that God has already claimed us as beloved children and nothing can change that. When we are filled to the brim with that lavish love, that love spills over to those all around us.

We hope this Lent will be an invitation to be authentically who you are, to

counter scarcity and injustice at every turn, and to pour out even more grace wherever it is needed. This love disrupts the scarcity mentality that oppression and hierarchy in all its forms can plant inside of us. Love, like water, rushes and overflows, touching everything in its path.



Guest Preacher Bio: Rev. Melissa Florer-Bixler



Melissa is the pastor at Raleigh Mennonite Church, one of our partner churches in ONE Wake. She is a graduate of Duke University and Princeton Theological Seminary. She spent time studying in Israel/Palestine, Kenya, and England. Much of her formation took place in the L'Arche community of Portland, OR. Now she prefers the Eno River and her garden in Raleigh, NC. She is the chair of L'Arche North Carolina and a steering committee member in

broad-based organizing in her county. Melissa's writing has appeared in *Christian Century, Sojourners, Geez, Anabaptist Witness, The Bias, Faith&Leadership,* and *Anabaptist Vision*. From time to time she publishes academic writing. She and her spouse parent three children.



"Jesus called us to love our enemies. But to befriend an enemy, we first have to acknowledge their existence, understand who they are, and recognize the ways they are acting in opposition to God's good news. In How to Have an Enemy: Righteous Anger and the Work of Peace, Melissa Florer-Bixler looks closely at what the Bible says about enemies—who they are, what they do, and how Jesus and his followers responded to them. The result is a theology that allows us to name our enemies as a form of truth-telling about ourselves, our communities, and the histories in which our lives are embedded. Family Promise Returns to GFBC

One of the primary challenges for people to survive and thrive in Wake County is housing. While we work to adjust policies and advance projects for affordable housing through organizing in ONE Wake, we also work to provide housing *now* for those who need it with Family Promise of Wake County.



During the height of the pandemic, families in the transitional housing program were living at the Family Promise center and some other properties owned by their non-profit. We are now transitioning back to a model of housing that uses churches as hosts for families in need. The change won't happen all at once, but Greenwood Forest will be one of the first churches to begin hosting families in our building again. We will welcome our guests March 20-27.

This week will be a smaller-scale relaunch of this ministry than we're used to at GFBC. We'll only be hosting 1-3 families for our week and will be paring down some of the roles we need help with at the church. Family Promise is also daily screening participants at their center and requires at least a negative COVID-19 test to enter their program.

How can you help?

We need volunteers to fill a few different roles throughout the week. Here's how you can help out:

Set-Up and Tear Down: We need people to help us set up the rooms for our guests and their overnight hosts. This involves setting up and making beds and a few other amenities in the rooms we'll be using. Contact Andy Jarrell (andyjarrell@gmail.com) if interested.

Overnight Hosting: We need some folks to stay overnight with our guests in case they need anything while they're here. You'd have your own room at the church and be here from 7:30pm one day to around 7:30am the next day. Overnight hosts also set up breakfast for our guests. Contact Rev. Meals: We need some Faith Formation classes or individuals to provide meals for our guests during the week. Meal hosts would need to be present from 6:00-7:30pm. Contact Natalie Patten (nhpatten@gmail.com) if interested.

Van Drivers: To help our guests with transportation, we often run a van between GFBC and the Family Promise center depending on the families' needs. Contact Dave Atkins (daveatkins313@gmail.com) if you're interested in driving.


Town Hall and Business Meeting

One of the great traditions and church disciplines of Greenwood Forest Baptist Church is the practice of a minister's sabbatical. Per our church's tradition and policy, every 5 years we provide for a period of intentional sabbatical for our Senior Pastor. The purpose of this period away from normal pastoral duties is for renewal, rest, creative work, professional development, and other experiences in order to reinvigorate the Senior Pastor and enhance their work in ministry at GFBC.

Rev. Lauren Efird. has served at Greenwood Forest for almost 11 years and is approaching her 6 year anniversary as our Senior Pastor. Rev. Efird offered to delay her sabbatical in the midst of the height of the COVID-19 pandemic in order to provide necessary leadership for the church. To mark her years of service, Rev. Efird will start a sabbatical this May lasting for 12 weeks. The rest of the church staff will be providing coverage of her critical duties during this time and we have an exciting series of voices lined up to fill the pulpit while she is away. We are grateful that Rev. Efird is able to continue this tradition at GFBC and are excited for the experiences she will share with us as a result!

COVID-19 Pandemic Guidance Update

This past week, the CDC introduced a new metric for determining COVID-19 risk: "COVID-19 Community Levels." The Community Level metric is an attempt to balance community spread and positive case count with vaccination rates and healthcare capacity in one's area. Based on this new metric, Wake County's COVID-19 Community level is low, which comes along with a loosened set of recommendations for public gatherings.

In light of this new metric, we are updating our COVID-19 precautions as of Monday, March 14. Our new guidance/precautions are as follows:

Masking

- Well-fitting masks are recommended indoors until Wake County's Community Transmission Rate is no longer high, but are no longer required.
- If you are isolating or have been exposed to COVID-19, you are required to mask according to the CDC's isolation/exposure guidelines (visit cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019ncov/your-health/quarantineisolation.html).

Distancing

- Physical distancing between those of separate households is no longer required.
- We ask that you respect the personal boundaries of those who wish to remain cautious. As a general rule, if someone continues to mask inside, we will assume they also wish to continue to distance from those outside their household unless they tell us otherwise.

Symptoms/Exposure

- Do NOT come onto campus with any COVID symptoms (fever or chills, cough, shortness of breath or difficulty breathing, fatigue, muscle or body aches, headache, new loss of taste or smell, sore throat, congestion or runny nose, nausea or vomiting, diarrhea)
- Do NOT come to church if you are within isolation/quarantine time frame even if you are asymptomatic.
 Follow all CDC/NCDHHS isolation guidelines (see Masking section) if you have been, or think you may have been, exposed to COVID.

Vaccination

 We strongly encourage all eligible people who engage with our community to stay up-to-date on COVID-19 vaccinations. If you need resources or information on vaccination, please contact the church office.

Ventilation

 We will continue to monitor and maintain good ventilation in all areas of our building but especially in the Sanctuary and Fellowship Hall where the largest gatherings occur.

Nursery

 Nursery workers are still required to mask around unvaccinated children until the Community Transmission is no longer high. Although this is not required by the new CDC guidance, we feel it is a reasonable precaution that prioritizes the safety of those who cannot choose to be vaccinated yet.

Omicron-Specific Precautions

- We are lifting the omicron-specific precautions we put in place in January 2022. The following activities can resume and these adjustments have been made to worship:
 - ⇒ in-person visitation
 - ⇒ communion during worship
 - ⇒ the singing of multiple hymns during worship
 - ⇒ we have removed the separate lectern for lay speakers
 - ⇒ food and drink can now be offered at indoor gatherings



Overall, we want to emphasize that we have operated in keeping with the best available scientific data and public health recommendations throughout the pandemic and will continue to do so. If there are signs of an impending surge or if it appears these loosened precautions become a risk for vulnerable people at GFBC, we will quickly move to reinstate stricter precautions. Even as we loosen required precautions, we encourage all individuals to continue engaging in the ways that make them feel safe and included, and to act in ways that prioritize the health and wellbeing of all within our community.
