Las Posadas by Donna Clair (Illustration)

The illustration on the cover of the bulletin comes from a children's book by Jean Ciavonne called "Carlos, Light the Farolito" about the novenario (extended devotional prayer) tradition called Las Posadas. It is celebrated in many countries in Central America, Mexico, and in Hispanic communities in the United States. Typically, Las Posadas is celebrated between December 16 and 24 (nine days, one for each month of Mary's pregnancy).

Las Posadas means "the lodging" or "the inns" referring to the shelter (or lack thereof!) in the Nativity story. Traditionally, a small child leads a procession through the streets of the town. The processions can take many forms but often involve children surrounding Mary and Joseph and musicians. As the procession goes door-to-door in town, they are refused lodging (though people often give refreshments). Every time they make a stop, someone reads scripture and everyone sings a Christmas carol. The procession ends in Mass and a celebration for the children.

Las Posadas recreates the conditions of the Nativity, conditions that endure today. Many find themselves unwelcome and unhoused in our world today. When we observe those who don't receive welcome in our world, we should see them as the Holy Family. When we welcome each other, we welcome God.

In "Carlos, Light the Farolito," a small child is afraid to play his part in Las Posadas but he does gather the courage to do so. In the end, Carlos doesn't want this time of generous welcome to end. "Can't I stay up just a little longer?" Carlos asks his grandfather on the final day, Christmas Eve. May we approach this season of welcome like Carlos and never let go of God's radical hospitality.


## Welcome

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

### The Passing of the Peace

The passing of the peace is a symbolic enactment of the reconciling love and mercy of God in our midst. We express it through a peace sign, a handshake, a wave, or many other expressions of peace. Be mindful and considerate of others' desire for physical space or distance.

### **Prayer in Worship**

We use many kinds of prayers in worship. The Call to Worship is a communal prayer using call and response. The Invocation is a single individual inviting (or invoking) God into our worship this morning. The Prayers of the People uses intercessory prayer to ask God to come to the world's aid. The benediction is a blessing offered over those gathered in worship.

A "doxology" is a short hymn that usually praises the Trinity. We sing the doxology as we symbolically present our offerings back to God.


### The Prayers of the People

This prayer typically has five parts: a confession; prayers for the earth, the world, and the church; and prayers for those with needs in our own community.

### Communion

During Communion, we gather around the table to remember and give thanks for God's saving acts with bread and wine. We have an open table—all who wish to take Communion are invited. We practice communion by means of intinction, which means you receive a piece of bread and dip it in the cup. A glutenfree option is available on the altar.

O hear the angel voices!


O night divine, O night when Christ was born! O night, O holy night, O night divine!
