Circumpolar AZ81 by LCGS Russ (Photograph, Taken in Arizona)


This photograph was taken over the period of 7+ hours of the night sky in Northern Arizona. The long exposure created star trails as opposed to single points of light. The circles are because the camera was focused on Polaris, the North Star.

Stories passed down from freed Black people in the nineteenth century attest that the song "Follow the Drinking Goard" was about the North Star, which is part of the "Little Dipper." The song conveyed instructions to follow Polaris to the North to escape slavery in the South. To focus on this star was to focus on liberation and freedom.

Watchnight as a tradition in Christian churches gained significance after New Year's Eve in 1862 when many Black people, enslaved and free, gathered in churches to await the hour when President Abraham Lincoln's Emancipation Proclamation was to take effect. The holiday was also called "Freedom's Eve." Gathering on Watchnight has since become a sacred and vital tradition in the Black Church in the United States.

Today, as we celebrate on the day after Freedom's Eve, may our focus be on the North Star; that is, may our focus be on freedom for all God's children.


Welcome





We use many kinds of prayers in worship. The Call to Worship is a communal prayer using call and response. The Invocation is a single individual inviting (or invoking) God into our worship this morning. The Prayers of the People uses intercessory prayer to ask God to come to the world's aid. The benediction is a blessing offered over those gathered in worship.

The Doxology


A "doxology" is a short hymn that usually praises the Trinity. We sing the doxology as we symbolically present our offerings back to God.

Anthem I Heard the Bells on Christmas Day


The Civil Wars
