

JOHN THE BAPTIST ARRESTED

Local religious leader detained for criticism of regional power players

John the Baptist had appeared in the wilderness of Judea, proclaiming, "Repent for the kingdom of heaven has come near." This is the one of whom the prophet Isaiah spoke when he said:

"The voice of one crying out in the wilderness: prepare the way of the Lord; make his paths straight."

John wore clothing on camel's hair with a leather belt around his waist, and his food was locusts and wild honey. Jerusalem and all Judea and all the region around the Jordan were going out to him, and they were baptized by him in the River Jordan, confessing their sins.

When he saw many of the Pharisees and Sadducees coming for his baptism, he said to them:

"You brood of vipers! Who warned you to flee from the coming wrath?"

Herod arrested John, bound him, and put him into prison on account of Herodias, his brother Philip's wife, because John had been telling him: "it is not lawful for you to have her."

Now when Jesus heard that John had been arrested, he withdrew to Galilee. He left Nazareth and made his home in Capernaum by the sea, in the territory of Zebulun and Naphtali.

From that time Jesus began to proclaim, "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven has come near."

As he walked by the Sea of Galilee, he saw two brothers, Simon, who is called Peter, and Andrew his brother, casting a net into the sea for they were fishermen.

And he said to them, "Follow me, and I will make you fish for people."

Immediately they left their nets and followed him. As he went from there, he saw two other brothers, James son of Zebedee and his brother John, in the boat with their father Zebedee, mending their nets, and he called them.

The cover of the bulletin this week recounts the events surrounding this week's Scripture reading. We begin our passage today with the arrest of John the Baptist, which would have been a seismic event in Jesus' circles. By all accounts, John was an influential regional leader, but he was known for his confrontational style.

The "news articles" are taken from passages in the Gospels, but how do you imagine today's news media might describe John the Baptist? We often think in glowing terms of past leaders, organizers, and activists; however, they were rarely celebrated in their lifetimes.

Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., whom we celebrated last week, was widely criticized and disliked in his day. Especially in the years before his assassination, the mainstream (largely White-owned and -operated) media turned on him for his criticisms of broader American society, including the War in Vietnam and the failure of the so-called "War on Poverty."

Who might we be reading negative headlines about today that we might lionize tomorrow? How can we change our outlook now instead of later?

This prayer typically has five parts: a confession, prayers for the earth, prayers for the world, prayers for the church, and prayers for those with needs in our own community.


Final Hymn: An Invitation
