





# Bulletin Art Underground Railroad

In 1872 a Pennsylvania freedman named William Still (1821—1902) published The Underground Railroad, a book that told the personal stories of almost three hundred travelers, many of whom he had sheltered on their dangerous journey north. Johnson selected thirty-six figures and seven vignettes that he traced from engravings in Still's book. Each boat, train, wagon, even the scene of the man climbing out of a shipping crate, signifies the arduous journey of a specific individual. Maria Weems, for example, in a hat and purple jacket at the upper right corner, was separated from her mother and sister at a Virginia slave auction when she was just thirteen. Abolitionists "purchased" her mother and sister, who were soon living as free women in New York. Two years later, an anti-slavery activist rescued the still-enslaved Maria and gave her boy's clothing. The two traveled north where she was reunited with her family. We don't know why Johnson chose these particular people to feature in his painting, but collectively their stories tell of lives oppressed by cruel masters, of pursuit by brutal slave catchers, and of assistance offered to the sick and exhausted by caring individuals, both Black and white.

#### **About the Artist:**



Born in South Carolina to a poor African-American family, [William H. Johnson (d. 1970)] moved to New York at age seventeen. Working a variety of jobs, he saved enough money to pay for an art education at the prestigious National Academy of Design. [...] Johnson spent the late 1920s in France, absorbing the lessons of modernism. As a result, his work became more expressive and emotional. During this same period, he met and fell in love with Danish artist Holcha Krake, whom he married in 1930. The couple spent most of the '30s in Scandinavia, where Johnson's interest in primitivism and folk art began to have a noticeable impact on his work.

Returning with Holcha to the U.S. in 1938, Johnson immersed himself in the traditions of Afro-America, producing work characterized by its stunning, eloquent, folk art simplicity. A Greenwich Village resident, he became a familiar, if somewhat aloof, figure on the New

York art scene. He was also a well-established part of the African-American artistic community at a time when most black artists were still riding the crest of the Harlem Renaissance.

Although Johnson enjoyed a certain degree of success as an artist in this country and abroad, financial security remained elusive. Following his wife's death in 1944, Johnson's physical and mental health declined dramatically. In a tragic and drawn-out conclusion to a life of immense creativity, Johnson spent his last twenty-three years in a state hospital on Long Island. By the time of his death in 1970, he had slipped into obscurity. After his death, his entire life's work was almost disposed of to save storage fees, but it was rescued by friends at the last moment. Over a thousand paintings by Johnson are now part of the collection of the Smithsonian Institution's Smithsonian American Art Museum.


# Welcome







We use many kinds of prayers in worship. The Call to Worship is a communal prayer using call and response. The Invocation is a single individual inviting (or invoking) God into our worship this morning. The Prayers of the People uses intercessory prayer to ask God to come to the world's aid. #### The Doxology


A "doxology" is a short hymn that usually praises the Trinity. We sing the doxology as we symbolically present our offerings back to God.


#### The Prayers of the People


This prayer typically has five parts: a confession, prayers for the earth, prayers for the world, prayers for the church, and prayers for those with needs in our own community.
