Bulletin Art Vanitas Still Life

Edwaert Collier

Just in front of the globe you see the Latin rendition of a word key to our biblical text for today: VANITAS. Vanitas, or vanity, is a theme in Ecclesiastes, which is known for its claim that "all is vanity." The painting by Edwaert Collier in 1662 is part of a sub-genre of still life paintings meant to express the principles of Ecclesiastes. The goal is to emphasize the limits of human life, the inevitability of death, and the futility of our activities. You'll notice that the table in the painting is strewn with the aspirations of the subject: a thick tome, musical instruments, finery, a quill, and a globe. Did the subject of the painting have ambitions of world travel? A musical career? A desire to write? Zeal for the finer things in life? In the end, none of it mattered, as the skull tucked behind the book suggests. In the end, all of it came to nothing because death comes for him. What does it mean to live in light of the inevitability of the end of life? What does it mean to find peace, satisfaction, and contentment in ephemeral things? Those are the kids of questions these painters sought to provoke alongside the author of Ecclesiastes.


Welcome




















Announcements Church Events and Updates



Help Stop LGBTQ Discrimination in NC

During the last legislative session, three bills targeting transgender and other LGBTQ people passed the NC General Assembly: a ban on trans athletes in women's sports (HB574), a "Don't Say Gay" bill (SB49), and a ban on gender-affirming care (HB808). All three were vetoed by the governor. If you'd like to help prevent those bills from overcoming the veto, write or call your state senator **and** state representative (regardless of party) and urge them to vote against these bills. The passing of the peace is a symbolic enactment of the reconciling love and mercy of God in our midst. We express it through a peace sign, a handshake, a wave, or many other expressions of peace. Be mindful and considerate of others' desire for physical space or distance.

Prayer in Worship

We use many kinds of prayers in worship. The Call to Worship is a communal prayer using call and response. The Invocation is a single individual inviting (or invoking) God into our worship this morning. The Prayers of the People uses intercessory prayer to ask God to come to the world's aid. The benediction is a blessing offered over those gathered in worship.

Final Hymn: An Invitation


