The Laying On of Hands Is a Time Honored Ritual (1997)

Edgar Sorrells-Adewale (USA, b. 1936)

This color offset lithograph by Sorrells-Adewale gives the impression of the religious ritual by which we consecrate individuals and commission them, or by which we pray for them. The text in the bottom right-hand corner reads:

The laying on of hands is a time honored ritual regarding the awakening of insight. It's motion is the inexorable twinness of the serpent and its wisdom is the ability to see what's hidden in plain view.

The piece is at the Philadelphia Museum of Art in Pennsylvania and carries this description:

The "laying on of hands" describes the action of a priest or other spiritual figure who physically touches a person or object of concern during a ritual. This act may be a symbolic or formal method of invoking spiritual intervention and is used in various religious practices throughout the world. Such rituals are typically focused on healing, blessings, or church-related sacraments.


Welcome







Join hundreds of neighbors across Cary to publicly meet with candidates for Town Council. The fall election represents a major opportunities to win commitments from candidates, including:

- supporting fair compensation for the 140+ families likely to be displaced from the Chatham Estates mobile home community;
- ensuring that the redevelopment of town campus includes affordable housing;
- renewing or expanding the \$9 million affordable housing fund we won last year;
- support for ONE Wake member institutions in Cary that are developing affordable housing on church-owned land.

The Doxology


A "doxology" is a short hymn that usually praises the Trinity. We sing the doxology as we symbolically present our offerings back to God.

Communion

During Communion, we gather around the table as Christ showed us, to remember and give thanks. We have an open table—all who wish to take Communion are invited. We practice intinction, which means you receive a piece of bread and dip it in the cup. A gluten-free option is available on the altar.




