





Bulletin Art Israelites Gathering Manna

Ercole de' Roberti (d. 1496)

According to the National Gallery (London, UK) where this piece is held, it was "once part of a predella of an altarpiece made for the church of San Domenico in Ferrara." A central panel of the tripartite work was a rendering of the Last Supper with the institution of the eucharist. One side panel depicted Abraham and Melchizedek and the other this rending of the Israelites gathering manna. The patron of the artwork, Eleonora of Aragorn (d. 1493) was particularly interested in the eucharist and for many at the time, "the story of the Israelites gathering manna – a heavenly 'bread' that fed them during their travels in the wilderness before reaching Israel – was often interpreted as a forerunner of the 'heavenly bread' of Christ's body." As we take communion together today, let us remember our Jewish siblings in faith whose own history of heavenly provision predates our own while we share in the same gratitude to God.

The Passing of the Peace

The passing of the peace is a symbolic enactment of the reconciling love and mercy of God in our midst. We express it through a peace sign, a handshake, a wave, or many other expressions of peace. Be mindful and considerate of others' desire for physical space or distance.

Prayer in Worship

We use many kinds of prayers in worship. The Call to Worship is a communal prayer using call and response. The Invocation is a single individual inviting (or invoking) God into our worship this morning. The Prayers of the People uses intercessory prayer to ask God to come to the world's aid. The benediction is a blessing offered over those gathered in worship.

The Doxology

A "doxology" is a short hymn that usually praises the Trinity. We sing the doxology as we symbolically present our offerings back to God. **The Prayers of the People** | *Rev. Spears-Newsome* Lord, in your mercy: **Hear our prayer.**

The Prayers of the People

This prayer typically has five parts: a confession, prayers for the earth, prayers for the world, prayers for the church, and prayers for those with needs in our own community.

Communion

During Communion, we gather around the table as Christ showed us, to remember and give thanks. We have an open table—all who wish to take Communion are invited.We practice intinction, which means you receive a piece of bread and dip it in the cup. A gluten-free option is available on the altar.

Final Hymn: An Invitation

During the final hymn, if you'd like to join our community at Greenwood Forest Baptist Church, we invite you to come forward to the altar. When you come forward, you'll be greeted by a minister and a deacon who will then introduce you to the congregation after the hymn. Welcome!
