





# Bulletin Art Golden Hour

#### Nicolette Peñaranda | Inspired by John 13:1-20 | mixed media on canvas

Within the overall composition of this piece, we see the West African symbol aban, which means fortress and demonstrates power and authority. Aban is the central image of *Golden Hour* and it is duplicated around the perimeter of the piece like a mighty fortress. The gold-plated vessel at the top represents the water Jesus uses to wash the disciples' feet. Around it are miniature mpuannum, the five tufts of hair. In Ghanaian culture, it is said that a priestess wore this hairstyle giving the symbol a meaning of deep loyalty and priestly office. The water drips directly down onto swollen feet, feet that bear no name. The section to the left of the vessel holds a tearful Peter. He refuses Jesus' hospitality and then backtracks when he learns the value of merciful water. Around him contains dwannini mmen, the horns of rams, and nyansapo, the wisdom knot. [...] Across from the image of Peter we see the Eucharist. When orienting this piece in a diamond formation, the cup looks overflowing. But when the canvas is sitting as a square, the wine is tipping out of the chalice, dripping in unison with the vessel onto the aban. The Eucharist is also one of the ways we receive Christ's mercy. Body and blood broken for us. Water is very versatile. The vessel of water is providing mercy. The swollen feet are receiving mercy. Peter is asking for mercy. The chalice has shed mercy.

There is a particular time of day we refer to as the "golden hour." This is when photographers love to take photos as the sun sits at a particular point, either after sunrise or before sunset, when daylight is redder and softer than when the sun is higher in the sky. A serious photographer does anything to capture that moment. [Depicted here] might just be the golden hour for the disciples. Jesus and his crew are tucked away, having their Passover meal. They are cleansing themselves and carrying on not realizing this will be the last moment of peace they will have. Sharing a meal with the people you love is one of the most glorious moments anyone could have—before what will end as a night of torture and betrayal. While Peter is tearful in this image, the overall vibe of *Golden Hour* is soft, rich. It feels like it is captured in marble as if nothing can destroy it.

This piece is normally reserved for Maundy Thursday, but I selected it for today based on the special moment we share with our friends from North Carolina Central University this morning. It is our prayer that the service this morning would be a golden hour that reflects the wonder and mercy of God. Reflected in the music of these composers, the talent of these singers and musicians, and the collaboration of our choirs is a glimmer of what God wants for the world: wisdom, love, and mercy. In particular, I believe the movements of this piece reflect the movements of the Sermon in Song -- the mercy shown to the pilgrim child is the kingdom of God.

### Monthly Ministry Highlight:

#### **Music Ministry**

We're going to see a lot from our Music Ministry this month! Each week, Rev. Dr. Stephen Stacks, Helen Bishop, and the Sanctuary Choir lead us in hymns; we saw our youth musicians lead us in worship on Feb. 4; and we'll witness the choir's collaboration with NCCU's University Choir on Feb. 25. These efforts wouldn't be possible without your generosity and gifts!

### Ensembles

**The North Carolina Central University Choir** has distinguished itself as a North Carolina treasure and one of the nation's most outstanding choral ensembles. With its diverse repertoire of sacred and secular music, the choir delights audiences with traditional church music, anthems, oratorios, spirituals and opera and musical theater choruses as well as contemporary gospel. In its 63-year history, the choir has recorded five albums and one compact disc. The choir has a rich touring history and is composed of music majors and a select group of non-music majors chosen through audition.

**The Greenwood Forest Baptist Church Sanctuary Choir** is a volunteer chorus that demonstrates the wealth of musical talent at GFBC. In addition to performing major works, the Sanctuary Choir provides leadership for congregational singing and an anthem for worship most Sundays. One of the hallmarks of the GFBC Sanctuary Choir is its versatility—from gospel to Western art music to jazz, the GFBC Sanctuary Choir performs at a level of excellence rarely seen in a church choir.

### Conductors

**Roberta Laws** joined the faculty at North Carolina Central University in 2014 as Instructor of Voice and Director of the University Choir. She is a celebrated vocalist who, after completing her bachelor's and master's degrees in vocal performance at Boston Conservatory, went on to perform on operatic and concert stages around the world with the most elite ensembles. In 2016, Ms. Laws was awarded the Excellence in Teaching Award by the North Carolina Central University Department of Music, and in 2018 she was granted the honor of being a guest conductor for the Concert Choir at the 58th Intercollegiate Music Association Conference.

**Rev. Dr. Stephen Stacks** is the Associate Pastor of Worship and Faith Formation at Greenwood Forest Baptist Church where he directs the Sanctuary Choir and leads all aspects of the congregation's musical and educational life. He completed his bachelor's degree in church music at Furman University, his master's degree in choral conducting at Boston University where he studied with Dr. Ann Howard Jones, and his Ph.D. at University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, where he wrote a dissertation on civil rights freedom singing in U.S. culture after 1968. He is also an adjunct professor at NC Central where he has taught musicology and musicianship courses for the Department of Music.

The benediction is a blessing offered over those gathered in worship.

#### **The Offertory**

During the offertory music, we pass plates across the pews as a way to make our collective offering to God and the wellbeing of this community. A short doxology follows as we offer our gifts. **The Prayers of the People** | *Rev. Wesley Spears-Newsome* Lord, in your mercy: **Hear our prayer.**




