Bulletin Art Garden Cities of Tomorrow (1902)

The garden city movement was an urban planning theory that promoted a network of cities connected by greenbelts of agriculture and natural resources. The general idea was that a central city was orbited by several satellites and the communities were all connected by natural resources and public transportation. Close examination of the drawing shows the special concern for social resources available to all the cities, even though we would question the execution of and language surrounding such institutions today. The idea, however, was for a self-sustaining community that prevented many of the issues that plagued Western urban environments (like poverty and pollution). None of the cities sustained themselves entirely on their own but existed as connected hubs. The concentric patterns of resources and transportation would provide leisure, necessities, and accessibility to residents of every community. The goal was to take the best of "town" and "country" to form a different understanding of what a city could be.

What I love about the garden city is how it questions our present social arrangements and how it doesn't see our current problems as inevitable. The garden city requires a level of proactive planning that makes it especially impractical for locations where people already live in large numbers; however, it is a helpful vehicle for questioning the status quo in which we live. The garden city also is an attempt to express love and support through urban planning, however imperfect. In the sermon this week, we'll talk about the kind of love that expands our circles of concern and the garden city makes a nice metaphor and social expression of those ideas.


Welcome



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

The Passing of the Peace

The passing of the peace is a symbolic enactment of the reconciling love and mercy of God in our midst, expressed through a peace sign, a handshake, a wave, conversation, etc. We hope you will take the time to greet and speak with those around you or with someone you haven't met!

Prayer in Worship

We use many kinds of prayers in worship. The Call to Worship is a communal prayer using call and response. The Invocation is a single individual inviting (or invoking) God into our worship this morning. The Prayers of the People uses intercessory prayer to ask God to come to the world's aid. The benediction is a blessing offered over those gathered in worship.

The Offertory

During the offertory music, we pass plates across the pews as a way to make our collective offering to God and the wellbeing of this community. A short doxology follows as we offer our gifts.

The Prayers of the People


This prayer typically has five parts: a confession, prayers for the earth, prayers for the world, prayers for the church, and prayers for those with needs in our own community.
