

Bulletin Art Trinity

Kelly Latimore is a non-traditional iconographer who developed his craft during his life with the Common Friars, a monastic community that birthed The Good Earth Farm, where they held weekly services and meals while growing produce for thier community and local food pantries. Latimore's iconography originally emerged from the communal life he experienced there and has grown into a sprawling collection of icons. Icons are a particular kind of art that invite the viewers into "holy pondering" and meditation on the subject of the icon. Latimore describes it this way:

"My hope is that these icons can do what all art can potentially do, which is, to create more dialogue. By transcending our biases, listening, and having inner silence about our convictions, our inherited traditions, or our favorite ideas we can become open to the patterns of work, knowledge and experience we may not have seen in the other or buried in ourselves. The other may have something to teach us about who God is, the world we live in, and who are our neighbors. This is the real work of being human and of art. Being more present."

This particular icon is based on a Trinitarian tradition that is typically exemplified by the Russian iconographer Andrei Rublev (see below). In Rublev's well-known icon, he depicts the visitors to Abraham (Genesis 18) sharing in a meal at a table, much like the three women here. Most interpreters of the icon see the visitors representing the three Persons of the Christian Trinity. Here, the angels (or Persons) are depicted as women from different parts of the world. Given the original icon's referent to hospitality, consider how this modern verson invites us into divine hospitality today.



There are other important differences between the icons. In Rublev's, the figures are distinct from one another and disconnected. Here, they are linked by hand. The open hands are also outstretched toward the viewer, as if inviting them to the table. The table itself is draped in many colors, which itself could represent the colors of the LGBTQ Pride Flag, the diversity of God's people around the world, or the promise of God to care for us.

In both icons, the arrangement of the feet and hands suggest a circle, reminding us of the completeness and interdependence of the Trinity. No one Person is divided from God and yet they have distinction from each other, but always in the divine community they form. The Trinity is a holy mystery that speaks to the communal, loving, and welcoming nature of God.





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

Town of Cary Proposes Budget with Millions for Affordable Housing

Members of Greenwood Forest Baptist Church and our ONE Wake partner organizations gathered on Thursday night to thank the Town of Cary for its ongoing commitment to affordable housing. Nearly \$6 million is set to be included in next year's budget for affordable housing, something once unthinkable in Cary. Persistent and consistent action preserves this momentum! There will also likely be a bond for the Town of Cary on the November ballot, which will include \$30 million for affordable housing. Stay tuned for more details!

Members of the Chatham Estates community met with Dorcas Ministries last Wednesday night, as well, to discuss another win for affordable housing: Stable Homes Cary. The Stable Homes program seeks to preserve affordable housing or keep people in affordable housing options in and around Cary. The Chatham Estates mobile home park (north of GFBC on Maynard Road) is up for sale, which would require residents to leave homes that the own but cannot be moved. Stable Homes will help with relocation and the costs of moving for residents and is a program funded by the Town of Cary and administered by Dorcas Ministries. Both residents and Dorcas agreed to a series of ongoing meetings to ensure the program meets the needs of residents.

Prayer in Worship

We use many kinds of prayers in worship. The Call to Worship is a communal prayer using call and response. The Invocation is a single individual inviting (or invoking) God into our worship this morning. The Prayers of the People uses intercessory prayer to ask God to come to the world's aid. The benediction is a blessing offered over those gathered in worship.

The Offertory

During the offertory music, we pass plates across the pews as a way to make our collective offering to God and the wellbeing of this community. A short doxology follows as we offer our gifts.


