Keynote Preacher for Black History Month

Rev. Dr. Mycal Brickhouse



Rev. Dr. Mycal Xavier Brickhouse is a distinguished community leader and a proactive change agent. His journey in faith and leadership has seen him ordained as an itinerant elder in the African Methodist Episcopal Church, pastoring in North Carolina, and serving as the Director of Alumni Relations at Duke Divinity School. Currently, he is the Managing Director of Programs and Grants at Leadership Education at Duke Divinity.

A lifelong Tar Heel, Rev. Brickhouse graduated from UNC Chapel Hill and went on to Duke Divinity School to earn a Master of Divinity Degree and his Doctorate of Ministry. He has completed the Black Theology and Leadership Institute at Princeton Theological Seminary and the Millennial Leaders Project Summer Conference at Union Theological Seminary. He is a trained frontline fundraiser, completing the

Discipline of Frontline Fundraising through Plus Delta Partners.

An active volunteer, Rev. Brickhouse served on the strategy team of ONE Wake, a broad-based community organizing group. He is also a member of the Board of Directors for The Colossian Forum, an organization committed to fostering Christian dialogue and reconciliation. Rev. Brickhouse has contributed to esteemed publications, including *Sojourners*, *Faith and Leadership*, and *The Christian Recorder*—the oldest existing periodical published by African Americans in the United States. He has been featured on BBC, NBC, and other local television networks.

Rev. Brickhouse is happily married to Kristin McCullough Brickhouse. They are proud parents of two beautiful daughters, Micah and Manaia, and a handsome son, Makoa. Their family life is a testament to the love and faith that Rev. Brickhouse preaches and practices.

Rev. Dr. Mycal Xavier Brickhouse continues to inspire and lead with a vision rooted in faith, education, and community service. His work and commitment make a profound impact on those he serves and the broader community.

Bulletin Art

Aaron Douglas, "The Toiler," (c. 1935) oil or tempera on board

Originally from Kansas, artist Aaron Douglas relocated to Harlem in New York City to take part in the growing movement of Black art, literature, music, and thought now known as the Harlem Renaissance. He first started painting in the European traditions but his fellow artists encouraged him to look into traditional African art, technique, symbolism, and motifs. He went on to study in Paris and Haiti to develop his artistic voice and aesthetic.

In this work, "The Toiler," a man stands in the field with a hoe looking toward a bright light coming from the edge of the canvas. No context is given for the time period, so numerous interpretations are possible. The man may be enslaved and looking toward the promise of freedom. He may be a sharecropper struggling in the post-Reconstruction South looking for hope and something greater. He may be a farmer with his own land looking upon the blessing of God pronounced over his labor. He may be experiencing a call from his own labors to something greater.

Lord's Prayer Update

During our recent churchwide Faith Formation series on the Lord's Prayer, we've made some updates to our liturgy. First, you'll see an asterisk next to "Father" at the beginning indicating that you may say any title/name of God to begin the prayer. Second, there was broad consensus that "debts" rather than "transgressions" was a more faithful rendering of the prayer and better spoke to its intentions. Many English-speaking traditions already use this language. That is now reflected in the bulletin.

The Passing of the Peace

The passing of the peace is a symbolic enactment of the reconciling love and mercy of God in our midst, expressed through a peace sign, a handshake, a wave, conversation, etc. We hope you will take the time to greet and speak with those around you or with someone you haven't met!

Prayer in Worship

We use many kinds of prayers in worship. The Call to Worship is a communal prayer using call and response. The Invocation is a single individual inviting (or invoking) God into our worship this morning. The Prayers of the People uses intercessory prayer to ask God to come to the world's aid. The benediction is a blessing offered over those gathered in worship.

The Offertory

During the offertory music, we pass plates across the pews as a way to make our collective offering to God and the wellbeing of this community. A short doxology follows as we offer our gifts.


