Bulletin Art

"The (Little) Tower of Babel" by Pieter Bruegel, oil on wood panel

Bruegel did at least three renditions of his famous Tower of Babel painting, perhaps the most well-known depictions of the mythical structure in the world. This one, named for the size of the painting not the size of the tower, like the others shows us the Tower as it is being built. Bruegel was known for the intricate details in his art and these Babel paintings are no exception. You can note the breadth of human involvement and commitment to the construction as well as the attention to individual architectural elements. Notable here are the obviously Romanesque touches to the Tower.

Bruegel could have used the architecture of many cultures from around the world, contemporary or past. Painted in the sixteenth century, he would have had plenty of reference material. However, it is suspected that Bruegel made the first painting (now lost) while in Rome. The Towers we have are seemingly deliberately evocative of the Roman Colosseum. The Colosseum is not far from the famed Roman Forum, which has similar motifs. The Colosseum is representative of both hubris and persecution. Hubris with its ties to an empire that thought itself eternal and persecution because of the stories of Christian martyrs who died in arenas like it.

What do you think Bruegel is saying by tying Babel to Rome?

If you were to depict the Tower of Babel today, what architectural elements would you include?

What are contemporary examples of the hubris and violence of the Colosseum that could inspire a new depiction of the Tower of Babel?

Gender-neutral, single-occupant bathrooms are located at the back of the sanctuary in the Narthex








Announcements | Church Events and Updates

New Sermon Series

From Genesis to Revelation, we'll examine stores, parables, and poems to determine how we identify and respond to empire in our midst today based on God's people have responded in Scripture.

The series is inspired by the book "Come Out My People!" God's Call out of Empire in the Bible and Beyond by Wes Howard-Brook. He depicts the struggle in reading the Bible as the conflict between a religion of empire and the religion of creation. One seeks to dominate and explore and the other follows God's way of life and peace.

Each week we'll have new art in the bulletin but also discussion questions around the art. You can

The Passing of the Peace

The passing of the peace is a symbolic enactment of the reconciling love and mercy of God in our midst, expressed through a peace sign, a handshake, a wave, conversation, etc. We hope you will take the time to greet and speak with those around you or with someone you haven't met!

Prayer in Worship

We use many kinds of prayers in worship. The Call to Worship is a communal prayer using call and response. The Invocation is a single individual inviting (or invoking) God into our worship this morning. The Prayers of the People uses intercessory prayer to ask God to come to the world's aid. The benediction is a blessing offered over those gathered in worship.

The Offertory

During the offertory music, we pass plates across the pews as a way to make our collective offering to God and the wellbeing of this community. A short doxology follows as we offer our gifts.

Communion


